- DARNELL, Henry Faulkner, P. E.** clergyman, author; b. London, Eng., June 24, 1831; s. Rev. James D. (rector Pentlowe and Cavendish, Essex); ed. univ. of Dublin and Cambridge; held. math. and classical professorships, Royal Sch., Raphoe, Ireland; admitted to deacon's and priest's orders, Church of England, 1858-59; in ministry and edn'l positions, England and Canada; since 1883 rector Zion Ch., Avon, N. - DARRAGH, Archibald B.** congressman, 11th Mich. dist., 1901-7; b. in Monroe Co., Mich., Dec. 23, 1840; s. B. F. D.; grad. Univ. of Mich., 1868; studied dept. law, same, 1 yr.; banker since 1870, St. Louis, Mich.; m. Monongahela City, Pa., May 9, 1875, Annie P. Culbertson. Enlisted Pvt. U. S. vols., Aug. 14, 1862; discharged as capt., Aug. 9, 1865; co. supt. schools, Jackson Co., Mich., 1867; pres. village St. Louis, Mich., 1879-80; mem. Mich. legislature, 1883-4; mayor city of St. Louis, Mich., 1893-4; mem. bd. control Mich. Asylum since 1897; Republican. *Residence*: St. Louis, Mich.
- DARROW, Clarence S.**, lawyer; b. Kinsman, O., April 18, 1857; ed. Ohio public schools; studied law; admitted to bar, 1875. Formerly att'y for Northwestern Ry. Has been identified with many prominent cases; of recent yrs., notably in cases against monopolies, including litigation against gas trust in Chicago; chief counsel for anthracite miners in the anthracite coal strike arbitration at Scranton and Phila., 1902-3, comm'n apptd. by President Roosevelt. Elected Ill. legislature, 1902. Active in political campaigns as Independent Democrat; twice married. Counsel in Debs strike case and large number of labor injunction and labor conspiracy cases on side of labor; platform speaker. *Author*: Persian Pearl (essays), O1; Resist Not Evil; Farmington (novel); An Eye for an Eye, 1905; various pamphlets on social and economic questions. *Residence*: 1337 Sheridan Rd. *Office*: 1202 Ashland Bldg., Chicago.
- DARTON, Nelson Horatio, U. S. geologist**; b. Brooklyn, Dec. 17, 1856; s. William and Caroline M. (Thayer) D.; common school ed'n; m. 1903, Alice Weldon Wasserbach. Chemist in New York, 1883-6; inventor of a sugar process; researches in tannic acid and water analysis which led to condemnation of 300 unhealthful pump wells in Brooklyn; has made U. S. geol. surveys in portions of N. J., N. Y., Pa., Va., W. Va., Md., D. C., S. Dak., Wyo., Colo. and Neb. and reports on artesian waters of Atlantic coastal region, Neb. and S. Dak. *Lecturer* at various colleges. Mem. Am. Geol. Soc., A. A. A. S., Washington Acad. Science, Geol. Soc., Washington, Am. Inst. Mining Eng'rs, Deutsche Geol. - D'ARVILLE, Camille, actress**; b. in Holland, 1863; 1st appeared in opera, Strand Theatre, London; came to U. S., 1889, to take rôle of Anita in "The Queen's Mate," Broadway Theatre, New York. Became mem. of Casino Co. and later of The Bostonians; then with E. E. Rice's Co. and after that as a star at head of her own co. Has taken numerous leading light operatic rôles.
- DARWIN, Charles Carlyle, librarian**; b. Paris, Tenn., Jan. 27, 1848; s. Charles and Mary (Platt) D.; grad. Oberlin, 1868 (A. M.); Union Theol Sem., 1868-70; m. Nov. 25, 1869, Gertrude Bascom. *Literary work* in New York, co-worker with Dr. Lyman Abbott, 1870-2; prof. Hebrew, Harvard Univ., 1872; librarian in Library of Congress, in charge of Smithsonian Library, 1872-83; librarian U. S. Geol.
