

S. Res. 4. Resolution requesting the War Department at Washington, D. C., and Congress of the U. S. A. to retain Camp Knox.

S. Res. 11. Resolution extending thanks to the Chamber of Commerce for courtesies extended the General Assembly.

S. Res. 12. Resolution inviting Hon. W. J. Bryan to address the General Assembly Thursday, January 19, or at some date in the near future.

Thereupon all other business was suspended, said resolutions were read at length and examined in open House, and the Speaker of the House in open Session and in the presence of the House affixed his signature thereto.

The Committees to which the same had been referred reported bills of the following titles, viz:

H. B. 16. An Act to amend the Act of the General Assembly of 1910, creating the Bureau of Vital Statistics, being paragraph 6062a, Chapter 63, Carroll's Kentucky Statutes, and to provide for the publication of index lists of births and deaths registered in the Bureau of Vital Statistics.

H. B. 96. An Act to authorize the valuation of bonds and other securities held by life insurance companies, assessment life associations and fraternal benefit associations, by the amortization method.

H. B. 18. An Act defining the civil liability of persons, firms, corporations owning or operating motor vehicles in this Commonwealth for damages caused by the negligence of their agents or servants or of persons entrusted by the owner or operator of such motor vehicle or by his, her or its authority with the use of possession thereof.

H. B. 42. An Act to amend Section 965 of the Kentucky Statutes relating to the time of holding Court in the 28th Judicial District.

Said bills were severally read the first time at length and ordered to be placed on the Calendar.

Upon a call of the Counties and Legislative Districts, the following bills were introduced, ordered printed and referred as follows, viz:

An Act to assist disabled ex-service men and women in obtaining from the Federal Government the relief authorized by Acts of Congress, creating for that purpose the Kentucky Disabled Ex-Service Men's Board, and appropriating funds therefor; providing for space in and stenographic assistance from the Adjutant General's office, and declaring an emergency to exist.
