# DEATH THREAT COMES TO EXPLOSION JUROR.

John E. Brink, proprietor of the Idle Rock Cafe, No. 236 South Spring street, and a member of the jury chosen by Coroner Hartwell to investigate and report the cause of The Times building explosion, which sent more than a score of faithful men to their graves, received a letter yesterday at his home in Ocean Park threatening immediate death if he fails to sign anything but a "no-decision verdict." The anarchist writer printed some of the words and wrote others, but the disguise is so poor that attaches of the Sheriff's office believe they have an excellent clew to his identity.

That the writer of the letter was thoroughly schooled in the work planned was evidenced by his peculiar reference to sneak up the front steps of the Brink residence on the ocean front, and place the missive under the door, rather than trust it to the United States mails. The letter was scrawled on ordinary papers of a cheap character.

MANY UGLY MESSAGES.

That the labor-union pickets are responsible for the letter sent to Brink is the belief of the attaches of the Sheriff's office and the police. Since the destruction of The Times building by enemies of industrial freedom and his newspaper, scores of letters of that character have been received by members of the explosion investigating committee, police judges, and public-spirited men who have voiced their sentiments against unionite outrages and methods of vengeance. Every letter received has contained the stereotyped phrase, "We will kill you." To palm and kill is apparently the premier idea of the unionites. Here is a

copy of the letter received by Mr. Brink:

"John Brink—I see you are on the jury to try boys against The Times. Now if you dare to give a decision no matter what the evidence is, I will get you. Now do not mistake this, as I mean biz, and will kill you. Now do as you see fit. I do not want you to act as I know you will give a decision as the evidence—Now look out. A warning.

"We do not want to kill Americans."

WOULD KILL A FOREMAN.

Another letter threatening death and hades was received by Bob Atkins, a foreman of structural iron workers employed in the Alexandria Hotel Annex construction. The writer presages the death of Atkins for choosing to work for the Lowell company, and also of the other men who are engaged with him.

A feature which indicates that the writer is a member of a band of desperate unionites who use the United States mails to further their plots, is that this missive, and that sent to Police Judge Chambers recently, were posted at Station C. This station is newly located on South Los Angeles street, scarcely a block from the Union Labor Temple. The letters were posted at the same time of night—9:30 o'clock.

The letter to Atkins is as follows:

"Hotel Buckley 743 South Hill street Los Angeles California. "Mr. Bob Atkins snake—Darn youe sole to hell—you and the other snakes, wots working with you. That you all have not got yores before this is no sine that you went before you leave Los Angeles. We no where you are, and damn you we will get you soon—Look Out.

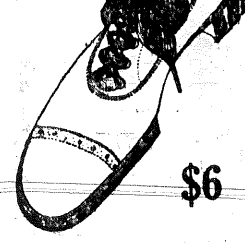

Unionites' Dynamite Is Discovered.

EXPLOSIVE FOUND AT HOME OF PORTLAND ADVOCATE OF OPEN SHOP.

POLICE SAY IT WAS EVIDENT INTENT OF CONSPIRATORS TO WRECK BUILDING.

PROMOTER TELLS OF RECEIVING THREATS BECAUSE OF ATTITUDE TOWARD UNIONS.

(BY DIRECT WIRE TO THE TIMES.) PORTLAND (Or.) Oct. 19.—(Exclusive Dispatch.) Discovery at the home of Charles K. Henry, wealthy promoter, and one of Portland's chief open-shop advocates, of six sticks of dynamite wrapped in burgundy and with fuses attached, has revealed what the police and Mr. Henry declare to be the most dangerous and destructive plot ever hatched in this city.

The discovery was made yesterday, but only was made public today. Henry is occupying a temporary residence in Laurelhurst, a splendid residence in being built for him nearby. He recently sold his city house which was one of the finest in Portland.

The dynamite was found in the forks of a cherry tree only a few feet from his temporary house, where it was found to be in a box which was wrecked at least part of the house.

"I have no personal enemies," said Henry tonight, "but I have antagonized labor unions by my recent stand for the open shop. Aside from this I can think of no causes that might lead to such a plot."

FIRM FOR OPEN SHOP. Mr. Henry is engaged in building the Thompson office building which, when completed, will cover a full block, and be one of the finest buildings in the city. Before starting the building, he made a tour of Park County and at its conclusion declared to the press that he was unalterably opposed to the open shop.

Portland and Los Angeles, he said, were progressing with San Francisco in building a block of ten-story ten-roomed. Mr. Henry then announced that open shop conditions would prevail in the building of the Thompson block. Union leaders here have exercised the heaviest possible pressure to influence Henry to modify his ultimatum, but in vain.

"In my opinion preparations were made to dynamite the Thompson building," said Chief of Police C. E. Connelley, "and the explosive did not come there by accident."

PLAN TO DESTROY HOME. After an investigation by a detective, the opinion was expressed that he exploded the dynamite in Henry's home last night, and that the person who put it there intended to return later and blow up the Henry home.

The dynamite was in nine-inch sticks of about seven-eighths inch diameter, and is wrapped in yellow paper with a red stripe and a red line. The name of the company that manufactured the dynamite could not be traced.

HOPE THAT THE ASSASSINS WILL BE CAPTURED TODAY.

Unearthing of the Conspiracy Shifts to San Francisco, and the Law's Hand Now Seems Near the Fiends. Tremendous Civic Demand.

OAKLAND, Oct. 3.—Captain of Detectives Walter Petersen stated tonight that he had information which leads him to believe that night to dynamite the Los Angeles Times building was hoisted in Oakland.

The sure hand of the law has ceased to grope. The searchlight of detective intelligence is at work, and untried San Francisco must give up its assassin. The marriage of the Times building will be completed. Information that night to dynamite the Golden Gate region indicates that it may be but a day until the dastards who composed the expedition of ruin and death with dynamite are before the bar of justice.

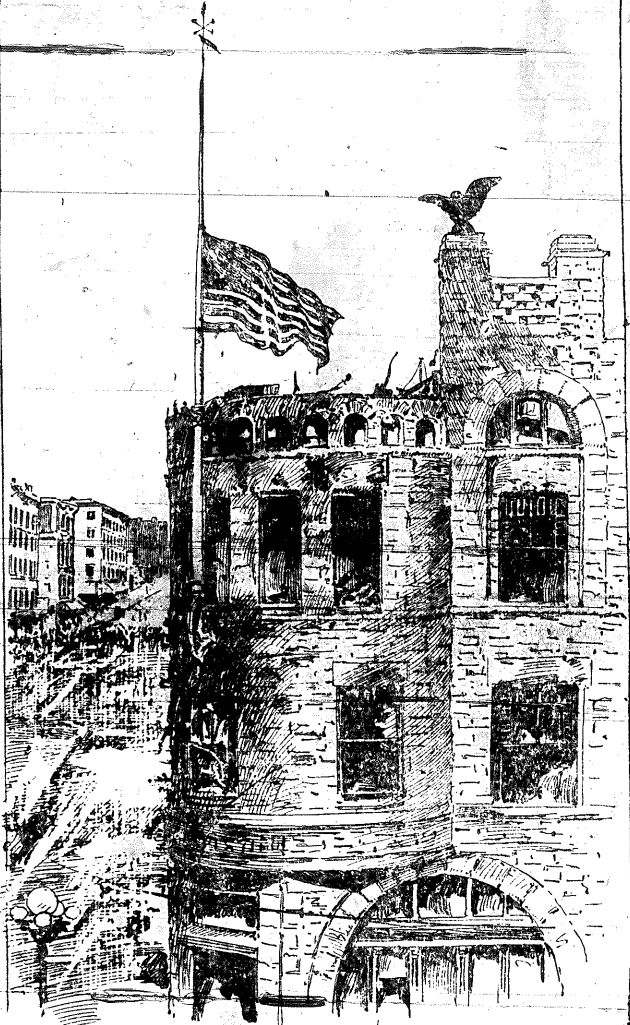
Not since the anarchical plots of 1856 has such a conspiracy been unearthed. Its ramifications are large and its scope greater than appeared from the discoveries made here. The facts now in the police holder have turned out, through the intelligent separation of fact from fiction, a collective story of the outlines of the conspiracy. But the police are not giving up the precious truths that mean so much to their ultimate success.

A CIVIC AWAKENING. Yesterday was an awakening for the civic conscience. After the shock of the terrible disaster had abated, and calmness returned, after the individual evidence of the diabolical character had been shown, the people of Los Angeles sent forth a determined demand for the guilty.

The Council led with an offer of \$100,000 for the arrest and conviction of each guilty man; the Supervisors of Los Angeles county offered a reward of \$100,000 for each conviction, and the official bodies are prepared to spend \$100,000 each to insure justice to the martyred dead and an outraged community.

And this is not all. In two hours Secretary Zschendanner of the Merchants and Manufacturers' Association, undaunted by bombs and threats, proceeded to invest \$100,000 in a fund that the business men of Los Angeles will offer, and which may reach \$100,000 before the week ends if the criminal act not, as is expected, apprehended before then.

LOOKING TO THE LIVING. The public mind is not wholly given to vengeance for the terrible crime and the intended crimes that were the relief of the families of those who were made victims of the midnight assassin. Officially the Mayor and the Council have asked contributions for a relief fund and the Mayor has designated ten receivers for it. A further precaution will be taken. The Council will be asked today to provide an increase of 250 men in the police force. This is not an emergency request. The patrolmen are needed all over the city and have needed for years because what the city has given by leaps and bounds the guardians of peace and safety have multiplied by frugal numbers under the spirit of some impatient dandy.

Each hour brings them nearer to the hiding people if they permit themselves to be taken alive.

### CENSUS SHOWS WORST DEATHS

#### DEATHS FROM INFLUENZA A DECREASE

**Tuberculosis Shown Deadliest of All All Pneumonia Running Second—Bright's Disease Notable Increase.**

The Census Bureau's mortality statistics for the public, shows some interesting features. There was a noteworthy decrease in the number of deaths from influenza, for instance. The deaths from influenza in 1909, as compared with 1908, are considered remarkable. Tuberculosis and pneumonia, diseases under respiratory diseases, closely associated with influenza, showed for bronchitis a number of deaths and a marked increase.

Pneumonia, in the aggregate, showed more deaths than other acute tuberculosis. The number of deaths increased from 61,269, or 1.2 per cent. of the population, in 1908, to 67,000 in 1909, the latter number being only 1.1 per cent. of the population of the lungs. The rates of deaths from pneumonia were lower than for any other disease of the decade.

Diseases of the nervous system increased from 71,090 for 1908, to 77,000 for 1909, the amount of increase being 8.3 per cent., being all the average for all causes. The death rate fell from 157.9 to 147.9 per 1000 population. The increase in the number of deaths in this class was due to apoplexy, those reported from pneumonia showing a marked increase.

#### CIRCULATORY DISEASES INCREASE

Diseases of the circulatory system largely increased, both in number and in death rate, reported, 80,607 to 90,450, an increase of 12.1 per cent., and in the death rate, 185.4, based upon estimated population. Increased deaths and rates were reported for pericarditis, endocarditis, angina pectoris, arteriosclerosis and diseases of the heart.

The greater part of the increase in this class was due to heart diseases, 5938, or 6.5 per cent. of the total, although the proportion of deaths from endocarditis, 912, or 15.2 per cent. of the total, is greater. The increase of the latter diseases show a strong tendency to arteriosclerosis, one of the most common diseases included, as a cause of death.

Diseases of the respiratory system showed about the same increase as diseases of the circulatory system for 1909 as compared with the preceding year. The number of deaths from pneumonia increased from 181.6 to 200.0 provisionally estimated. Bronchitis showed about the same number of deaths in 1909 as in 1908, a reduction in 1909 in the death rate from 26.9 to 24.9 per 100. The increase in this class was due to pneumonia.

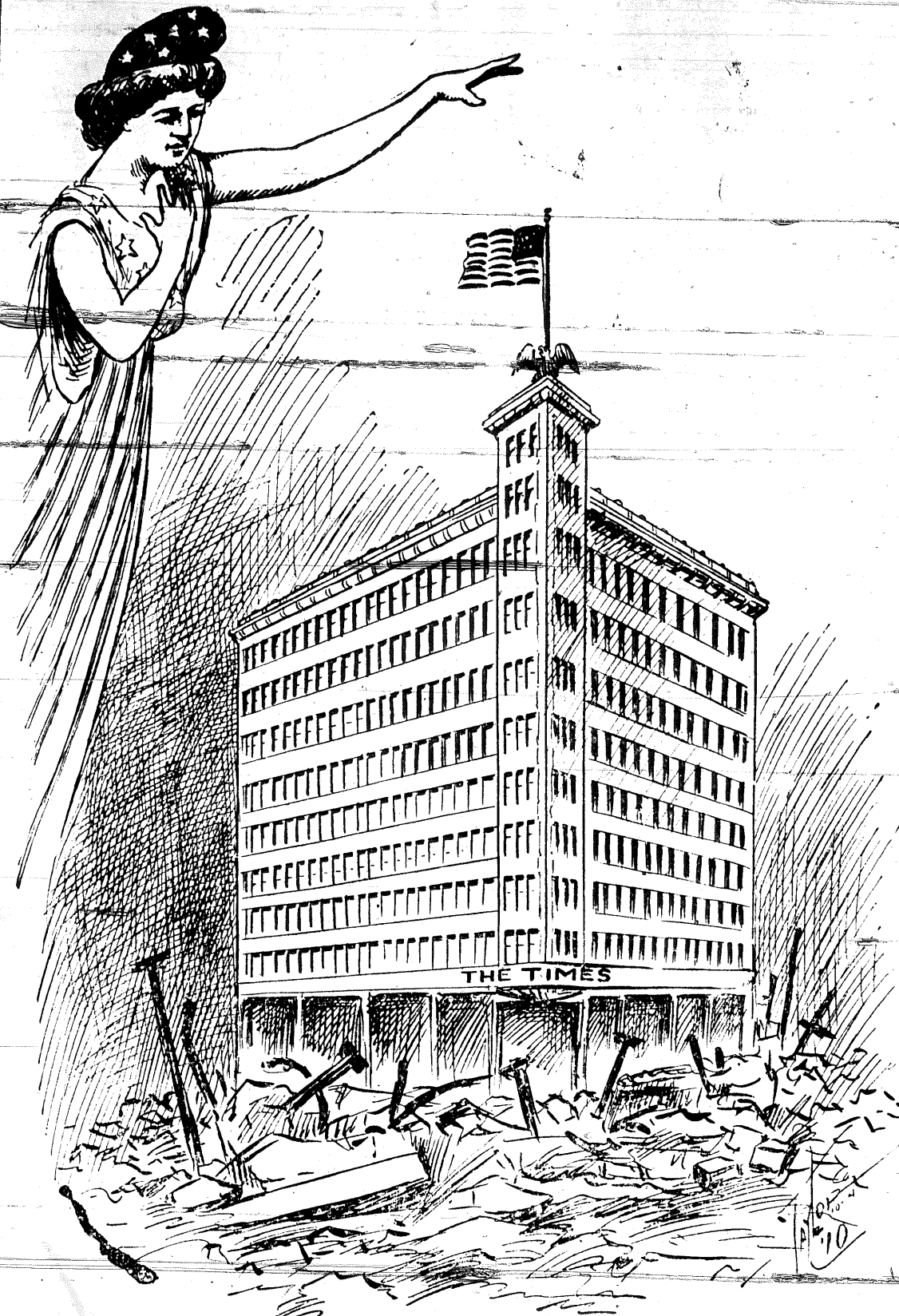

"This is all true, my credulity has been imposed upon," he declared. "I am astounded at this news. We have had the gravest assurance given us by everyone connected with the trial, either directly or indirectly, that these men were innocent."

Gompers said with the greatest emphasis that not the slightest intimation of such a change in the plans of the defense was communicated to him. He had been told the first news of the startling developments was given him on the train tonight, he said.

Asked if he would have anything to say about the prisoners personally, the labor leader replied:

"No, I don't want to add to their misery by condemning them."

"What effect do you imagine this will have on labor unions?" he was inquired.

To this Mr. Gompers snapped his fingers and ejaculated:

"None!"

When the fund raised by the American Federation of Labor for the defense of the McNamara brothers was reported, Mr. Gompers said contributions to date amounted to about \$10,000, which had been turned over to the chief attorney for the defense, and the collection was still going on.

Mr. Gompers bristled up noticeably when shown the statement by William J. Burns at Chicago, in which he said, "I don't wish to mention Burns," he said, decisively.

When the attorney for the sugar trust, which was on trial before the court, sought to call attention to the law in the case, he was chided by the Chief Justice with "Can that chatter about the law. We make our own laws." The trust was convicted and ordered "quilled apart."

The steel trust was the next victim, charged with having "goldbricked" T. R., although the justice of that name violently protested that "you goldbricked me." The protest did not avail and the president of the trust was sentenced to four hours private conversation with Atty-Gen. Wickham.

HOPING FOR PARDON.  
The McNamaras are banking on this promise and because of this are keeping silent about their accomplices. The brothers were shackled together tonight at five by their berth. Under Sheriff Robert Brain and his side men all night, awake and watchful that they did not try to escape or kill them. The two convicted men appeared cheerful and joked with each other and Sheriff Hammett.

John J. McNamara was handed a written question list before he and his brother retired for the night. The question was handed him by Sheriff Hammett, and was as follows: "Did Samuel Gomper or any other prominent official of the American Federation of Labor have any knowledge of your activities?" Did they know that you were using dynamite?" John McNamara read the question and then went to bed. He seemed to be impatiently tickled. He sneezed to be choked. Then he drew up his hands with an expressive gesture and refused to make any answer.

Just before the McNamaras had their question list presented to them, they were asked to sign a statement. "What have you to say regarding the crimes for which you have been sentenced?" "I am ashamed from telling my story and don't want to talk any more about it," said John McNamara.

"Don't you feel as if you should tell what you know of the guilt of the men who led you into committing these crimes?" "Yes, was the answer. The fact that the dynamiters were in the train was kept secret as Sheriff Hammett feared.

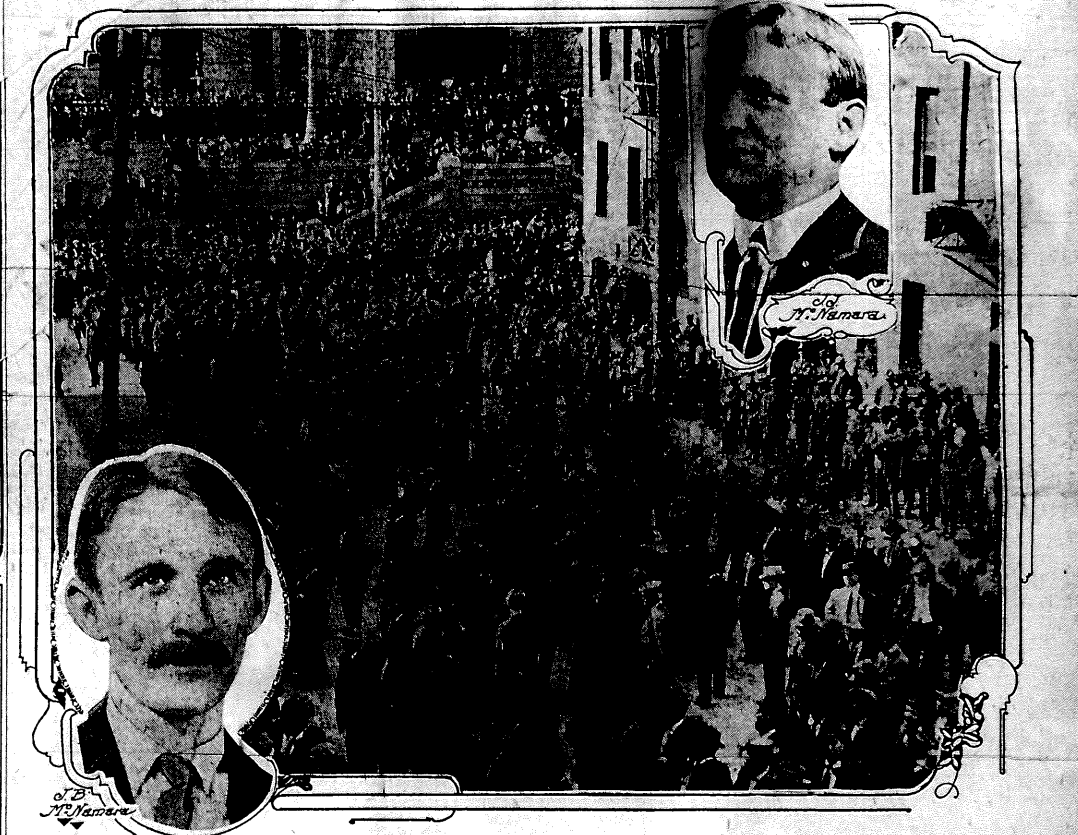
**BEFORE FEDERAL GRAND JURY.**

**CROWDS STORM COURT HOUSE LIKE WOLVES.**

**Morbid Humanity Packed in Tens of Thousands in the Streets, Grounds and Corridors Leading to the Little Room Where the Guilty Dynamiters Received Their Sentences—Sentiment of Throng an Ugly One.**

THE largest crowd ever attendant upon the trial or sentence of persons criminally prosecuted in Los Angeles county blocked the corridors of the Hall of Records yesterday morning and threatened to get beyond control. From 7 o'clock until 10 hundreds of curious men and women filled the entrance to the courtroom in the Hall of Records, where the sentence of the McNamaras was scheduled to be given. Judge Bordwell's courtroom is on the sixth floor of the building, and weeks ago every possible precaution was taken to keep out a frenzied crowd.

The doors leading to the courtroom were locked and in the corridors were special officers under the direction of Chief Detective Browne of the District Attorney's office. In addition a squad of policemen was stationed to keep order in and about the building. The early visitors were mostly those without any hope of getting into the courtroom except through some stroke of luck. The early comers thought it possible that the doors would be opened and the doors remained closed and the officers on duty would only admit court officials, well-known lawyers and those having special passes.

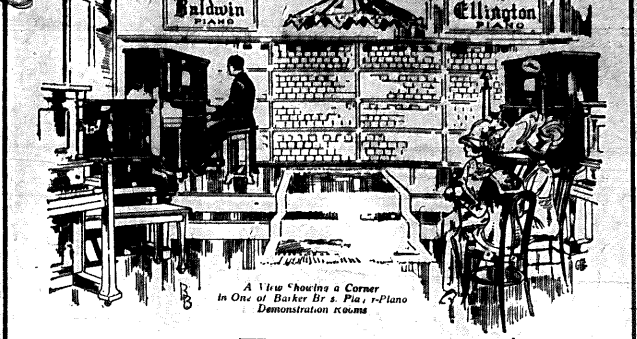

# NEWSPAPERS SAY ABOUT M'NAMARA CASE.

**Who Furnished the Money?**  
 [New York World:] Any organization that can be employed in the wholesale commission of the most blooded crimes must be reconstructed. The first step is to incorporate the same, to make them responsible to law, precisely as capital is responsible to law.

**Faith in Gompers Shaken.**  
 [Philadelphia Record:] The faith of more than two million working men in the Gompers administration has been shaken by the confession of the McNamara revelations.

**Darrow's Sympathy Pecuniary.**  
 [Philadelphia Record:] Darrow says he knew last March that the McNamara boys were guilty, but he had already espoused the cause of the man who had been the constant enemy of the rich and the poor, and he could not help taking the case in order to save the lives of the prisoners. One of the officers of the Federation of Labor says that Darrow's fee was not less than \$25,000, so that his sympathy with under dogs to fight was rewarded by a substantial pecuniary consideration.

**Unions Stand Arraigned.**  
 [New York Evening Post:] These horrible crimes stand out not merely as separate and individual acts, but as a part of an organized movement, of which they were but an incident and a weapon. Confession of one crime of this sort implies a common origin of all similar heinous crimes and maintains and assassinations. It is simply the McNamara case and the labor unions behind them, that have stood arraigned before the public eye. Unless they promptly take measures to clean up their organizations and turn with much horror from their murdering agents as does the entire nation, they will fall under an instant and overwhelming condemnation from which they can never recover.

**Now Is Unionism's Time.**  
 [New York Times:] If organized labor disapproves of murder as a means of improving life, condition, now, unambiguously, it must issue its condemnation publicly and unmistakably known.

**Who Planned the Lawlessness?**  
 [Christian Science Monitor:] What terrible new crimes to know, and what must not be prevented from ascertaining how far these men were tools and partners of a conspiracy, with its plotters in high places. It is known already and it has been known for some time, thanks to Detective Bureau, that the series of dynamite explosions affecting the property of firms refusing to make concessions to organized labor was the work of men carrying out a definitely planned campaign. What the public must insist upon knowing by a Federal inquiry now on, it is not by action of the California court, is: Who planned this widespread lawlessness that spread and neither the law nor liberty? With that information to hand American public opinion can then proceed intelligently to assign blame where it belongs. Weaklings need not be made the scapegoats for lawless anarchism in the guise of friends of labor.

**Must Condemn the Methods.**  
 [New York Sun:] The injury to the country is the original aim and end, and its legitimate course may be irreparable unless the unions now, unambiguously, condemn the methods that have brought organized labor to such a pass and indicate the purblind and less sagacious whom they have permitted to lead them.

**Will Do Good.**  
 [New York Mail:] Though the exposure of this dastardly crime was for the moment discredited organized labor deeply, it will do it good in the long run. It will teach the workers a wholesome suspicion of ribt talk and unprincipled self-seekers. It will help them to get rid of the idea that everything that labels itself "labor" is virtuous and sacred and everything that does not bear that mark is treacherous, unprincipled and base. It will force organized labor to disincantate.

**Still Much to Be Done.**  
 [Cleveland Plain Dealer:] There is much still to be done in the Times explosion case and the incidents seemingly associated with it. There are criminals yet to be captured and justice to be meted out. The cause of justice in America will be advanced if the same common-sense methods which have marked the developments of the past week shall continue to the end.

**Runs Down the Bribers.**  
 [Washington Star:] The McNamara case should not close with the sentencing of the men who have just confessed and the prosecution of others who may be accused of complicity in the crime. The court at Los Angeles has a duty to perform even as important as the punishing of dynamite in the detection of their users. There is no punishment too severe for that sort of work. It strikes at the roots of justice. It seeks the corruption of the court and the destruction of the integrity between the community and moral chaos. The bringing of the jurors in the McNamara case was as grave a crime as the dynamite case. If in the pursuit of the men who destroyed buildings and lives small attention is paid to those who undertook by bribery to prevent conviction and punishment the most and the officials will neglect the most urgent duty that constitution of law impose upon those charged with its enforcement.

**Most Atrocious Crime.**  
 [New Orleans Times Democrat:] Viewed solely in relation to the enormity of his crime, the escape of James E. McNamara with a life sentence must be regarded as a miscarriage of justice. He confessed to the murder of twenty men. His plea of extenuation—that he "did not intend to take the life of anyone"—is, of course, no more than a confession of cowardice. No man capable of such a heinous crime would be willing to accept a sentence of life imprisonment. He has murdered in his heart, and he has murdered in his deed, twenty men. It is not surprising that this case has attracted so much attention.

**Time for Housecleaning.**  
 The time is ripe for a thorough housecleaning, and nothing would so help the whole legitimate labor movement as the destruction of property and the casting out of every man who has in any way knowingly assisted or countenanced such a heinous work as the McNamara and others have been guilty of. Organized labor in its true aspect has the respect and sympathy of the whole reputable and substantial public, and should probably do so, in order to feel the pulse of the nation. Without fear and without compromise the McNamara case should have been done, and without it now nothing can be done that has been done can be maintained.

**"A Blood Hunt."**  
 [San Francisco News-Letter:] Anarchist Stefano and his string of accomplices are being hunted in the wake of the investigation and prosecution of a "blood hunt." Well, it is in the blood of the McNamara victims that hunt, the blood of scores and scores of innocent men who have been murdered by "sluggers" and "wrecking crews" and "fining squadrons" and "industrial committees" during the industrial crisis. 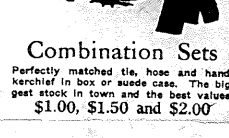

# RACE DYNAMITERS! FREE THINKERS COLONY

### Tacoma Detectives Are Reported to Have Evidence that Some Appalling McNameara Outrages Were Concealed in a Nest of Three Hundred Persons Described as Anarchists on Joe's Bay on Washington Coast.

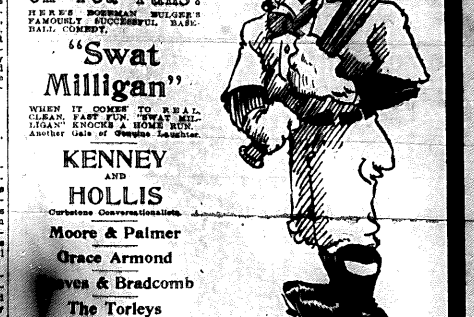

# "I AM ASTOUNDED."

## GOMPER'S STATEMENT.

(BY A. F. MIGHT WIRE TO THE TIMES.)

NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—"I am astounded! I am astounded! My credulity has been imposed upon. It is a bolt out of a clear sky."

The exclamation were those of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, when advised tonight of the pleas of guilty in the McNamara case.

Gompers, on his way from Washington, was dining in a Pullman car on the Pennsylvania Congressional Limited when he was advised that New Jersey station by an Associated Press representative.

He retired to the rear of the car where there was a convenient light and read carefully the accounts of the sensational developments at Los Angeles.

The United labor leader, was visibly affected as he read how the men in whose defense he had spoken and worked so untrusting had admitted their guilt. Tears came into his eyes and the hand that held the typed page shook.

"If this is all true, my credulity has been imposed upon," he declared. "I am astonished at this news. We have us by everyone connected with the trial, either directly or indirectly, that these men were innocent."

Gompers said with the greatest emphasis that not the slightest intimation of such a change in the plans of the defense as developed today had been communicated to him. Absolutely the first news of the startling developments was given him on the train tonight, he said.

Asked if he would have anything to say about the prisoners' personality, the labor leader replied:

"No, I shan't add to their misery by condemning them to their fate."

"What street do you imagine this will have on labor unions?" he inquired.

To this Mr. Gompers snapped his fingers and ejaculated:

"None!"

When the fact raised by the American Federation of Labor for the defense of the McNamaras was mentioned, Mr. Gompers said contributions to date amounted to about \$10,000, which had been turned over to the chief attorney for the defense. The collection was still going on. He added that the money probably would be refunded.

Mr. Gompers bristled up noticeably when shown the statement by William J. Burns at Chicago.

"I don't wish to mention Burns," he said, decisively.

He denied, however, that he had ever charged Burns with "planting" the dynamite at Los Angeles.

Referring to the explosion, Mr. Gompers continued: "I am not sure that we are patriots and peace-loving men and that we have a right to call out the best elements in human nature. It is not an act that is condoned with all the force that is behind it."

"Again, if he believed today's statement that I had charged that of labor, tears came into Mr. Gompers' eyes as he answered:

"They are not going to do any good. But I want to repeat that the cause of labor has been imposed upon by both supposed friends and enemies. The men of labor were led to believe that McNamara boys were innocent, and they acted on that belief. I read letters from them myself, protesting their innocence. Only last September I visited them in the Los Angeles jail and they were as innocent as I am. I have interests in a message that they were innocent."

"The cause of labor cannot win by such methods as these men pursued. They are not going to do any good. We have denounced and done all in our power to prevent it. I am not going to get to be stamped out."

"But it is known we have been imposed upon, we are denounced and attacked for supporting the defense of these men. Then they do pronounce and attack. The American Federation of Labor is a law-abiding institution."

Gompers said he had known John J. McNamara several years.

"John J. was a very self-contained man with a great fund of humor and was a good fighter. He said: 'I would never have suspected him of being a lawbreaker. He had no innocence, but I would condemn the act of these two men even if they had been able to get away with it without being convicted. This unexpected self-conviction is nothing but a failure of the two men to be usual to live up to the high principles of our cause. I do not see the defect just condemnation upon the cause of labor as a whole. The American Federation of Labor might take exception to the news as a recent for him to make any prediction."

"The American Federation of Labor has always believed in his innocence," he added. "As a possible special meeting, it is too early to say."

HIGH-POWER EXPLOSIVE CAUSED THE DISASTER.

City's Committee Determines That and the Definite Location. The following report, submitted to the city's committee yesterday, makes absolutely clear the fact that a high-power explosive (nitro-glycerin or dynamite) was used to blow up and burn the Times Building.

LOS ANGELES, CAL., October 8, 1910. HON. GEORGE ALEXANDER, Mayor of the City of Los Angeles.

Dear Sir:—Your Committee, to whom was referred the matter of the investigation of the cause of the destruction of the Times Building, at the corner of First and Broadway, at about 1 o'clock A.M., October 1, 1910, makes report as follows:— The investigation of the disaster was taken up immediately upon the appointment of your Committee, which appointment was made on Saturday, October 1, at 11 o'clock A.M.

It was decided that an inspection be carefully made of the proceeding of clearing the debris, the work of doing which was inaugurated by the City under the direction of the Street Department... The testimony of eye-witnesses was also sought and taken and diligence was used to run down all the rumors that might in any way throw light on the subject.

CHRONOLOGY OF A TRAGEDY THAT SHOOK THE WORLD.

Dynamiting and Burning of the Los Angeles Times Building and Plant—The Occurrences of the Entire Week, Day by Day, Graphically Related—The Crime and the Pursuit of the Criminals.

[NOTE: This summary of the chief features of the awful crime and disaster of October 1, 1910, is now made primarily for the information of those who are unable to read the paper. It does not have had full opportunities to get full, accurate and connected narratives of the gruesome and bloody crimes of conspirators, assassins and incendiaries.—H. G. O.]

THE events of the week just past are beyond new news; they are "old news" to the people of Los Angeles and American history. As such, the Times herewith presents the log book of that terrible week.

For the information of those who will read this disaster at a distance—a distance either of time or of geography—a brief preliminary statement should be made.

For nearly twenty years this newspaper and its editors had been waging a battle against the industrial working men against the oppression and tyrannies of the labor unions.

During all of these years the Los Angeles Times has been the chief organ of the industrial warfare of boycott, violence and attempted intimidation had been carried on against the Times by the unions. Every union man in the United States was assessed a contribution of three years to maintain the battle. The Times achieved a decisive victory for itself very early in the fight and unyieldingly held the position until the end.

The Council met again today and passed the amount of the reward to \$10,000 for each dynamite caught. The Council has received \$5,000 in the form of a treasury if necessary.

The Board of Supervisors voted \$5,000 reward for each man found to be concerned in the plot.

The Oakland chief of police announced today that he knows the plot to have been hatched at that city.

MORE BOARDS OF EXAMINERS FOR THE UNIONISTS.

The governing purpose of trade unionists is to increase the wages and limit the hours of labor of its members, and to compel employers of labor to hire only members of the union. 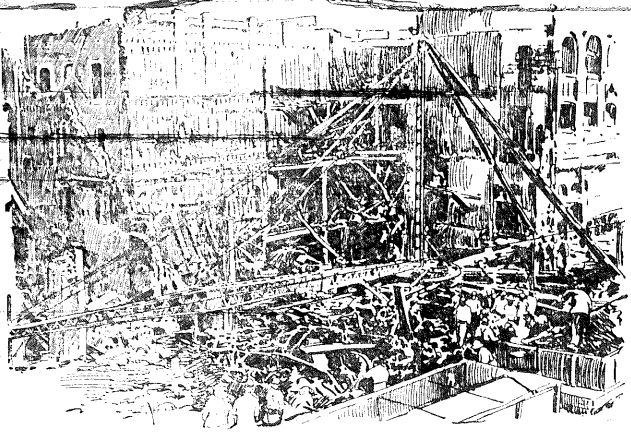

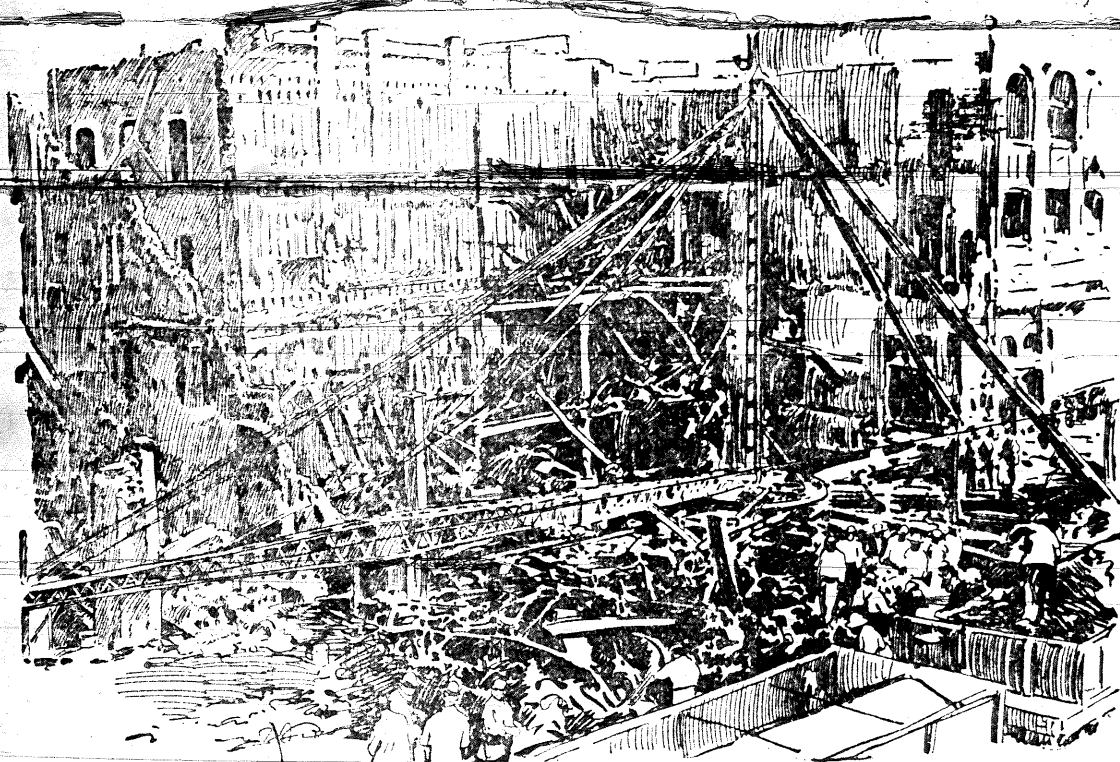
The board also adopted resolutions of condolence and regret on the death of Harvey W. Scott of Portland, Or., late a member of the board.

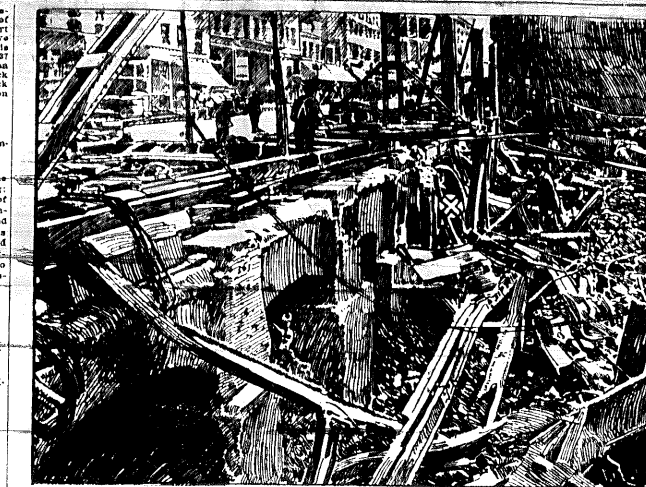

BED-ROCK FACTS.
